



Gregory V. Button, PhD. He is presently a professor in the Department of Anthropology at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville. For over a decade Dr. Button was a faculty member at the School of Public Health at the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor and a core faculty member at the School's Health CDC funded Preparedness Center. For nearly three decades he has been conducting research on both natural and unnatural disasters as well as bioterrorism.

His publications on disasters address, coastal communities, human rights, media coverage, vulnerability, scientific uncertainty, environmental health, disaster recovery, forcible displacement, environmental justice, crisis communication, and disaster policy. For the last two years he has been conducting research on the impact of Hurricane Katrina along the Gulf Coast with funding originally provided by the National Science Foundation.

Dr. Button has been a consultant and advisor to many federal, state and county agencies as well as international NGOs. He has also served national advisory boards on issues dealing with disasters. In 1992 he was awarded a Congressional Fellowship and served in the United States Senate as a health policy advisor. His research has been featured in the national media including many of the country's leading newspapers and on National Public Radio.
