Administrative Responsibilities and Accomplishments:

Dean, Office for Women's Affairs (OWA), Indiana University (2008-Present)

Reporting directly to the Provost and Executive Vice-President of Indiana University, I lead Indiana University—Bloomington's campus-wide programs for academic support and professional development of faculty, staff and students with an emphasis on women. Working with Vice Presidents, other Deans, Chairs, the Office of Affirmative Action, Police, the Executive Director of Residential Services, the University's Health Center, Parking, Dean of Students and the Graduate School, I manage a half-million dollar annual budget to facilitate gender equity, high quality research, policy development, monitor compliance, facilitate tenure, promotion and advancement for faculty, access, safety and curricular development issues for students and professional development opportunities for staff. During my stint as Dean, I have managed to develop additional enrichment opportunities on campus while also building up a reserve of a quarter million dollars. In my capacity as Dean, I have:

- Facilitated the development of a thematic residential program for female undergraduate students in science, math and technology which will be used to enhance recruitment and facilitate retention and success of students.
- Developed campus-wide mentoring program for faculty replete with training workshops, toolkit resources, evaluation mechanisms and reward structure that is being effectively utilized and replicated at IU, IUPUI and other campuses.
- Founded the Inter-Campus Coalition for the Advancement of Women, which provides a framework for Deans and Directors on the other campuses to share strategies, best practices and resources for the advancement of women on some of IU's campuses and Purdue University.
- Revamped OWA's campus-wide newsletter, *Majority Report*, into a well-respected 28-page magazine for the dissemination of information on the status of women, issues in higher education, research about gender equity and as a forum for sharing the accomplishments of women faculty, staff and students.
- Conducted campus-wide, survey-based research on the status of child care on IU's campus and data were used to enhance child care operations and to work more effectively on access issues.
- Worked to establish policy that all first year and transfer students must complete a mandatory online sexual assault education program and secured the funding to pay for the program.
- Designed modified duties and mentoring policies for faculty.

Director of Graduate Studies, (2002-2003)

In this capacity, I led in the following ways:

- Developed partnership with Future Faculty Teaching Program to bring about an integrated programming structure for training graduate students in the areas of teaching, research and service
- Co-sponsored the visit of Nobel Winner and Costa Rican President Oscar Arias for a departmental lecture and visit with graduate students;
- Professionalized the graduate access, including enhancing online access to all application, funding, curriculum and assessment processes.

Director of Graduate Studies & Admissions (2003-2007),

With a budget of \$250,000, I managed the graduate portfolio of one of the largest and oldest departments

on the Bloomington campus of Indiana University, including four subfields and 75-100 graduate students. I helped to develop and restructure courses and programs, supervised enrollment management processes and course scheduling, graduate student staffing and evaluation of undergraduate courses, reviewed syllabi, served as the Chairperson's chief advisor on graduate issues, monitored and resolved policy issues, worked with the College to develop relations with alumni, served as a liaison to the Graduate School and the College of Arts and Sciences, worked closely with departmental faculty and the College in ensuring the integrity of course offerings, doctoral examinations and teaching instruction by graduate students. As Director of Graduate Studies and Admissions, I achieved the following:

- Increased the recruitment of female graduate students by 50%, which resulted in our department being removed from the at-risk list on issues of gender equity in graduate studies.
- Led a departmental review and strategic planning of the graduate program, which involved one-on-one structured questionnaire sessions with all faculty, graduate student survey and various meetings;
- Worked with a 5-member committee of senior faculty to devise a report based on the findings, which included recommendations for major programmatic and curricular changes, many of which are still in place. The recommendations were passed by a majority vote.
- Led departmental assessment of the graduate program as part of department's external review evaluation, including survey data, written analyses, meeting with external review committee and College officials.
- Supervised a budget of over \$250,000 for graduate program and increased the scholarship budget with additional funding for fellowships by engaging in cross-departmental initiatives which provided access to funding from other departments.
- Revised the 15-year-old Department's Guide to Graduate Studies, integrating curricular and programmatic changes that were recommended and approved by faculty vote as well as structural changes in the presentation of information.
- Monitored and resolved policy issues with graduate students and faculty vis-à-vis the graduate program.
- Wrote a successful competitive departmental grant that provided a 15% increase in the stipend funding for graduate students.
