All students are required to take at least one South African focused course (in any discipline).

To select courses at the University of Cape Town (UCT):

- I. Review the academic section of the CIEE website at http://ciee.org/program_search/program_detail.aspx?page=2&sec=1&program_id=134&type=part.
- II. Get linked to the various faculties (schools) and departments at the University of Cape Town. An alphabetical list is located at <http://www.uct.ac.za/faculties/list/>. Each faculty/department may have a department-specific list of classes that are available. There may also be courses available in performing or creative arts for qualified students.
- III. Review the Faculty Handbooks (course catalog) for courses in the Humanities at <http://www.uct.ac.za/students/undergraduates/handbooks/>. You will have to download MagView to view the handbooks (free download available on the website). Courses may be taken in all University of Cape Town faculties within the humanities excluding Health Sciences. Courses in the Law faculty are only offered at the post-graduate level. Most students will find courses in the **Undergraduate Handbook** or in the **Performing and Creative Arts**.

Note: Course numbers will end either in an "F" or "S" (for fall or spring). However, since South Africa is located in the southern hemisphere, the seasons in South Africa are opposite from the seasons in the U.S. Therefore, the fall semester at UCT is February-July and the spring semester is July-November. **You must select classes for the appropriate semester!**

NOTES:

*Undistributed Overseas Study courses (**DEPT-OS 100**) have not yet been evaluated by an IU department, so they do not have a specific IU equivalent yet. You may present the course description and

syllabus to the appropriate department to have the course pre-approved for a specific IU equivalent before you go abroad. Please note that some departments may require that you present course materials after you complete the course before they will grant a course equivalency. In some cases the course may count as elective credit only. DEPT-OS 2/3/400 courses have been evaluated by the department as being equivalent to 2/3/400 level coursework, but there is no specific IU equivalent based on content.

^BIOL-OS 300 courses will count towards Biology on-campus lecture credit. In order to obtain lab credit, you must submit more information about the course including a syllabus to Dr. Ruesink in the the Biology department for approval.
