## Lunch with Marjorie Hershey

Friday, April 11, 2008

11:45 a.m. in the Presidents' Room

### *Dr. Marjorie Hershey*



Professor Hershey's research and teaching interests focus on political parties, campaigns, and elections. With regard to research, she continues to examine the process by which political activists and journalists construct explanations for election results, what they think the results mean, out of the welter of possible explanations that could account for why one candidate won and another candidate lost, or why a party's fortunes changed in a particular election year.

Hershey is also currently involved in research on the relationships among media coverage, campaign fund-raising, and poll numbers in presidential primaries, and in a national research project on competitive races in 2006. She has published two books of research and a number of articles in journals such as the *American Journal of Political*

*Science*, *Journal of Politics*, *Public Opinion Quarterly*, *Polity*, *Political Communication*, *The Annals*, *Social Science Quarterly*, and *American Politics Quarterly*. Her research has also appeared in the form of chapters in edited volumes.

Among the courses she teaches regularly are *Political Parties and Interest Groups*, *Environmental Policy*, and *Political Campaigns* (at the undergraduate level), and *Issues and Approaches in American Politics and Political Parties*, *Interest Groups*, *Social Movements*, and *the Media* (at the graduate level). In 1999 she took over authorship of *Party Politics in America*, the major parties text begun by Frank Sorauf and then written by Paul Allen Beck; she has been responsible for the 9th through 12th editions of this text. She has been fortunate to have received several teaching awards.

She is extensively involved in community service, including volunteer work with Girl Scouts, the Hoosier Hills Food Bank, Sounds of South (the show and classical choir of Bloomington High School South), and other groups. Her professional service has included the presidency of the Midwest Political Science Association, a variety of program committees for national political science conventions and APSA and MWPSA committees (for instance, the APSA's Epstein Book Award committee for the best book on political parties published in 2004 or 2005, which she chaired in 2006), and programs to improve the teaching of government and politics at the high school and college levels.

### SPRING CLEAN UP....WHAT DO WE SAVE?

Part of our history and culture is disappearing," said Phil Bantin, University Archivist, who has stepped up efforts to archive born-digital information published on the IU Web site.

"Mission-critical records such as course bulletins are now published only online,"

Bantin said, "but may be lost forever because of inconsistent efforts to retain them." The Office of University Archives and Records Management, which Bantin directs, is the most comprehensive source of information on IU's history.

"My job is to take the long-term view," he said, "and to give researchers the information they need to understand and reconstruct the history and culture of IU."

### The Power of Narrative

Marsha L. Roberts, Ph.D.

Come hear Marsha read from her memoir, "Tobacco's Child," which chronicles the impact tobacco use had on not only within her family, but on the American culture of post WWII. In the context of this very personal story, she will also share the unintended effect on readers and listeners. "I thought I was writing for my own benefit, as a way to get some relief-as catharsis, if you will. Then, a young woman who had heard me read "Tobacco's Child" months earlier recognized me in a restaurant and stopped to say: "...I quit smoking because of you and what you read." It was only then that I realized the potential benefit my story had for others.

Marsha, a licensed psychologist, practiced psychotherapy in Idaho for 20 years before coming to Bloomington. She is now a research/writer at IU.

## SPLASH BACK TO THE GRAND CANYON

Those who attended the Grand Canyon Reunion, a travel talk presented by Ronald Kovener, had a good time enjoying the beauty of the canyon, learning the details of a rafting experience, sharing tales of successful and shorter than intended hikes from the rim, and recalling the narrow dusty trail traversed by the mules that regularly carry tourists. Ron's slides, selected from the many he took on two raft trips down the river made everyone feel wet from the rapid's spray and tired from the steep hikes into the side canyons with their impressive waterfalls.

Carol and Dick Darling shared their experience of hiking from the south to the north rim, knowing in advance that the north rim is 1000 feet higher than the south rim so their climb was much longer than their descent, but weather forced them to take the more rigorous route. One story about the mule ride drew a lot of laughter. An employee in a rim hotel explained to a guest that she would go by van to the corral, and at the end of the ride, the van would bring her back to the hotel. When the mule reached the bottom of the canyon, the woman asked where the van was to take her back to the hotel. The U Club person who observed this event said the mule wrangler almost had to tie the woman onto the mule to get her back to the canyon rim where the van would take her to the hotel.

Those attending also enjoyed wine, cheese and crackers thoughtfully provided by Mary Jane and Marvin Blustein and three kinds of cookies baked for the event by Carol Darling from recipes in the *Grand Canyon Pioneers* cookbook. Carol thoughtfully shares the following recipe for anyone seeking a great taste of the Grand Canyon.

### Best Cookies

Beat to fluffy:      2 sticks butter (not margarine!)  
                              1 c. granulated sugar  
                              1 c. brown sugar- packed

Add:                    1 beaten egg (large)  
                              1 c. veg. oil  
                              1 tsp. vanilla  
                              Mix well

Sift and add:        3 1/2 c. flour  
                              1 tsp. soda  
                              1 tsp. salt

Add:                    1 c. quick oats  
                              1 c. coconut  
                              1 c. Rice Krispies  
                              2 c. chopped nuts



Mix & drop by teaspoonfuls on ungreased sheet. Flatten with glass dipped in powdered sugar.  
 Bake 9-11 min. at 325 degrees- to light brown.  
 Sprinkle on more powdered sugar while hot.  
 Makes 90+ cookies
