Series on New Commons

Scientific knowledge, community gardens, public health, plant seeds, outer space, city sidewalks, genomes, open source communities, snow-mobiles, the radio spectrum, wikipedias—these are all types of resources that have been identified as commons or common-pool resources. This series focuses on a rapidly growing area of study that is only now being recognized: new commons.

In the past ten years, scholars and diverse groups from multiple disciplines, political interests, and geographical regions are increasingly finding the term *commons* crucial in addressing issues of social dilemmas, degradation, and sustainability of a wide variety of resources.

For the first time, this series brings together scholars who have been exploring aspects of new commons. Hess starts the series off with a map of the new commons. She surveys new commons sectors, identifies “entry points” into the commons, and discusses the challenges of arriving at a unified definition of “new commons.” Hartzog looks at new forms of collective action within online commons communities. Milun takes a multidisciplinary, cultural-studies approach to better understand global commons. Bollier draws from his extensive publications on various types of new commons. He discusses both the threats of new enclosures as well as the vitality of gift economies and the recent rise of commons movements. Fischer and Steed have opened a new door in urban forestry considering whether street trees are an unidentified or misunderstood common-pool resource. Communities and homeowners are struggling with who can do what to street trees without ever considering the consequences of their actions.

Appendix E: Visiting Scholars

Long-Term and IFRI Visiting Scholars

Arthur Arinaitwe will be a Visiting Scholar at the Workshop between January and April of 2008. Arthur will continue working with Pamela Jagger, a Workshop affiliated doctoral candidate. They will be writing several papers based upon a year-long field research study on how reforms in Uganda's forest sector have affected the livelihoods of the rural people and forest sustainability. Arthur has worked as a research assistant with leading research and academic institutions including: Makerere University Faculty of Agriculture; Makerere University Faculty of Forestry and Nature Conservation; Foundation for Advanced Studies in International Development (FASID); the Graduate Institute for International Studies (GRIPS) – Japan; Indiana University; the International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI); and the Uganda Bureau of Statistics. He has worked on projects focused on natural resource management, agriculture, rural poverty, forests and livelihoods, health. Arthur has a Bachelor of Arts in Environmental Management from Makerere University and has recently defended his Master's thesis for the award of Master of Science in Environment and Natural Resources at Makerere University. His Master's thesis is titled "Land use, Use rights, Tenure and Tree Planting in Uganda." Arthur is interested in continuing studies in the field of Development or Resource Economics.

Joseph B. Bahati (December 7, 2007-May 20, 2008, CIPEC and Workshop Visitor) is a Fulbright scholar based at the Uganda Forestry Resources and Institutions Center (UFRIC), Makerere University. He is the database manager at UFRIC and lectures at the Faculty of Forestry, Makerere University. While at the Workshop, his research activities will include the analysis of the IFRI/SANREM databases investigating the implication of decentralization on livelihood, biodiversity and ecological sustainability as a result of community interactions with forests in Uganda. He will also analyze land use change (forest extent dynamics) with emphasis on the IFRI sites in Western Uganda.

Xavier Basurto (August 2007-May 2009) is passionate about improving our understanding of how humans can avoid tragedies of the commons and devise enduring self-governing institutions in socio-ecological systems. To this end he has studied small-scale fisheries, terrestrial, and marine protected areas in the Canadian Maritimes, the U.S. Southwest, Mexico, and Costa Rica. The goal of his dissertation was to understand Costa Rica's twenty-year old experiment on the decentralization of biodiversity conservation. At the Workshop Xavier is working on publishing his dissertation work and developing his research agenda further. Xavier holds a M.S. from the School of Natural Resources, and a M.P.A. and a Ph.D from the School of Public Administration and Policy at the University of Arizona.

Esther Blanco (fall 2007) is a PhD candidate in Economics at the University of the Balearic Islands, Spain. Her research addresses the governance of natural resources at tourism destinations under an economic approach. Motivated by the recent appearance of Tourism Collaborations and Partnerships for Sustainability, which are voluntary cooperative ventures at tourism destinations, her research deals with the economic incentives existent behind their emergence and stability. Her research objectives while at the workshop are the development of an environmental quality contribution game at mass coastal destinations which will be later extended to incorporate institutional designs leading to "big success" or "big failure" as nash equilibrium outcomes. A simple static one shot normal model will be specified for these purposes.

Newton Paulo Bueno (August 2007-July 2008) is Associated Professor at Department of Economics of Federal University of Viçosa, Brazil. He has been working in institution dynamics modelling using the system dynamics approach. While at the Workshop he will apply this approach in modelling small socio-ecological-systems dynamics with special emphasis for the case of developing countries.

Chen Jianguo (August 2007-May 2008) is a Ph.D. student in public administration at the School of Public Administration, Renmin University of China. His research activities deal with governance of public local economy in cities, especially concerning the community governance. At the workshop, he focused on the collective actions and governance of common pool resource in communities.

Daniel Cole (fall 2007) is the R. Bruce Townsend Professor at the Indiana University School of Law - Indianapolis. He is the author or editor of 6 books and more than 30 articles, mostly relating to the law and economics of property regimes, pollution regulation, and resource conservation. He has also written extensively about Poland and Polish law. While at the Workshop, Professor Cole will be working on two projects. One is a paper on post-Kyoto climate change negotiations, which will be published in 2008 in the Current Legal Problems series by University College London. The second is a paper, co-authored with Sanjay Peters, on China and the Environmental Kuznets Curve, which is to be the first in a series of papers comparing economic development and environmental performance in China and India from a new institutional perspective.

Gabriela de la Mora (fall 2007) is a PhD Student in Sociology at the Political and Social Science Faculty of the National Autonomous University of Mexico (UNAM). She has conducted research in governmental, non-governmental and academic organizations. Her research focuses on governance and social institutions related to common pool resources for forest management, and recently she started working on

water issues as well. She is visiting Scholar at the Workshop in Political Theory and Policy Analysis at Indiana University. She is participating at the Seminar and Colloquio activities, as well as the IFRI Program Training. The goal of her visit is to continue developing her doctoral research about a case study of a Mexican rural community.

Gunn Elin Fedreheim (fall 2007) is a Ph.D. candidate at Department of Social Sciences, Bodø University College, Norway. She is also working at a researcher at Nordland Research Institute. In her research she is working on nature conservation in Norway, and then particularly with areas conserved as national parks. Her dissertation will identify the institutions that either enable or constraint business development in national parks. At the workshop she will be working both on a paper on the laws and regulations that govern people's actions in national parks, and on her theoretical part of the dissertation.

Yunho Gang (January 2007-July 2008) is an Associate Professor, Division of International Commerce and Maritime Administration, Korea Maritime University, South Korea. His scholarly interests are in the areas of new institutionalism. He has studied various topics about public affairs and public policies. While at the Workshop, he will be working on public budgeting and ocean natural resources (coast, oil, fish, etc.) from the perspective of new institutionalism.

Gustavo Gordillo de Anda (November 2006-May 2008) is a retiree from the UN Food and Agriculture Organization where he acted from 1995 to 1997 as Director of Rural Development at FAO's headquarters and from 1997 to 2005 as Regional Representative serving the 33 Latin America and the Caribbean member nations based in Santiago de Chile. He has been former Deputy Secretary at the Ministry of Agriculture and Water Resources and Undersecretary for Agrarian Organization at the Ministry of Land Reform in Mexico from 1988 to 1994. At the Workshop, he will be developing his research project Incentives for Political Cooperation in fragile democracies in Latin America focusing on Brazil, Bolivia, Chile, and Mexico. This research has two objectives: revise the impact that mores and social norms have had in shaping the institutional arrangements that brought democracy back from authoritarian regimes and military dictatorships in those countries, and secondly, the impact Left parties once they are elected into national governments have on facilitating or obstructing political cooperation.

Mukund Kulkarni (August 22-October 28, 2007) is president of SHODH: The Institute for Research and Development; and Resident Editor of *Navarashtra* (Marathi Daily), Nagpur, India.

Maria Claudia Lopez (academic year) expects to receive her PhD degree from the Department of Resource Economics at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst in November of this year. Her area of specialization is Natural Resources and Environmental Economics with a minor in Development Economics. Maria Claudia has a master's degree in Rural Development from Universidad Javeriana (Colombia). Her dissertation is focused on the experimental analysis of internal and external institutions to promote cooperation among users of shared local natural resources in Colombia. For that purpose, she conducted economic experiments, surveys and participatory workshops in rural areas with more than 450 fishermen and mollusk-harvesters to analyze the effects of different institutions on the exploitation of common resources. At the Workshop she will be preparing the papers from her dissertation for publication as well as pursue the analysis of new experimental data with the same designs of the dissertation.

DLC Statistics

The number of unique visitors to the site nearly doubled from December 2002 to December 2003, rising from 3,577 to 6,882 visitors.

Web analyzing software revealed that at the end of 2004, there were over 70,000 unique visitors—a ten-fold increase since December 2003.

The number of DLC users increased dramatically in 2005 to 127,987. In 2006, the number of unique visitors to the DLC rose again to a total of 133,691, an increase of 5,704 users. In 2007, the number of unique visitors to the DLC jumped considerably, to 180,890. There were 819 papers posted to the DLC in 2007 by 15 individuals or institutions. Sixty-nine papers and eight dissertations were scanned and mounted on the DLC. The DLC staff got permissions from 186 authors and entered 467 items into the digital library; 50 were CAPRI papers. There are currently 2,057 full-text items on the DLC.

DLC Image Database

Castle has been meeting weekly with Elinor Ostrom to collect metadata on several hundred research/travel images for the image database.

Library Activities and Projects

- Andrew Revelle accepted a new position at Miami University of Ohio in March 2007. The Library Coordinator position was reclassified after Revelle's departure because it was learned that the position had been misclassified. Emily Castle was hired as the new Workshop Library Coordinator in March 2007. She began work on April 2, 2007.
- Castle interviewed, hired, and trained 2 new student library assistants and 5 DLC assistants.
- The DLC staff scanned 107 items (text and photos) from the Liberian archives for the Librarian land reform project.
- Librarian Kathryn O'Bryan worked as an archivist on a volunteer basis during 2007. She archived the Glaser Archive Collection of German materials on the Swiss Alps that had been collected by Workshop affiliate Christine Glaser in the 1980s. O'Bryan and Hess design and implemented an Archive record type for the Workshop Library database. O'Bryan archived 138 items, which is the bulk of the collection. She also drafted a finding aid to the collection
- The IFRI archives that were left by Krister Andersson were moved to Room 302 in Park 1. The WRL staff began organizing and entering the archives into the library database. The primary documents will be sent to Michigan. The secondary items will be added to the WRL collection.
- Charlotte Hess and Elinor Ostrom submitted the Final Report to the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation for the grants "Scholarly Communication as a Commons: The Digital Library of the Commons as an Integrative Resource and a Test-bed for New Research and A Planning Grant to Study New Institutional Designs for Digital Scholarly Communication, July 1, 2003 – December 30, 2006" on February 15.
- Hess did the final editing of new database entries and merged them into the library database. At the end of 2007 there were a total of 77,000 records.
- Library and campus tours were given to visitors and IFRI participants.
- DLC grant funds (received from RUGS in 2004) were used to add some of the important new information technology equipment to the Workshop Seminar Room, including videoconferencing hardware. In order to make more room for participants in the Seminar, Hess deaccessioned several hundred inactive items from the collection and she and Castle moved the rest of the Urban Collection into other downstairs rooms in Park 1.

The Workshop supports approximately 50 resident users (people who have offices and will be at the Workshop for a semester or more), these consist of staff, affiliated faculty, graduate students, and visiting scholars from all over the world. In addition, the Workshop supports a varying number of short-term visitors. At any given time there may be 45 to 65 people using Workshop computing resources.

A significant number of Workshop users are visitors for whom English is a second language. Workshop users generally, can vary widely in their level of computer literacy and their accompanying needs.

Services

The Workshop supplies the following services in-house (except where noted).

- Software and hardware acquisition.
- Desktop computers and associated hardware and software maintenance
- Network access via the IUB network
- Printing services
- Network file storage
- Limited network backup services
- Managed virus protection
- Scanning and OCR services
- Web development and maintenance
- Database development and maintenance
- Limited application serving
- Limited web serving
- User support and consulting services with regard to all of the above

Equipment

To support the Workshop's educational and research mission, the Workshop maintains approximately fifty-nine desktop computers, two scanning/CD production workstations, three laptops, one small enterprise server, and one development/utility server for a total of approximately (at any given time some machines will be down for service) sixty-five computers.

Computers are distributed among the fifty-four office spaces and six public access spaces, in thirty-one rooms, in four different buildings. Public facilities include (nominally) one computer in room 208 and three computers in room 300. Access to room 301 is controlled for scheduling reasons having to do with the scanning equipment.

Workshop computers range in capability from useable but aging 1200Mhz Dell computers to custom-built workstations with multiple hard-drives and DVD-burners. The majority of Workshop computers are Dell packages available via IU's purchase agreement.

About forty percent of the computers at the Workshop have been built from scratch by Workshop IT personnel. The foregoing proportion is an artifact of a dramatic infusion of equipment during 2003, historically, more than half of Workshop computers are constructed in-house.

Given the Workshop's history of limited resources, constructing our own computers from high-quality parts was found to be an ideal, low-cost acquisition approach. Quality parts can be reused in updated computers for five years or more.

In addition, at any particular time the Workshop provides limited support for a small number of non-Workshop machines that users have provided themselves and are being used in support of Workshop activities.

Additional equipment includes eight workgroup printers, a data projector, a CD-ROM printer and four scanners of various types, including a dedicated document scanner.

Software

The Workshop's primary operating systems are Windows 2003 Server and Windows XP. Linux is being experimented with in various roles.

The Workshop uses Microsoft Office 2007 as its primary office suite. Various other software is offered consistent with availability via Indiana University purchasing agreements. Exceptions to this include;

- Library Master, the application used by the Workshop Library for cataloguing its collections.
- Fine Reader, an Optical Character Recognition program used for document scanning.
- ArcServ, our network backup program.
- PaperCut, our print monitoring software.
- Adobe Creative Suite 3

Workshop Information Technology in 2007

Fall 2007 was one of the busiest semesters the Workshop has ever seen. Visitors filled all available office space, and some visitors had to use offices in Mathers Hall.

In addition, The Workshop was responsible for hosting the IFRI training seminar in Fall 2007. Initially, it was estimated that eleven computers would be required. OVPR's assistance was invaluable here; the Workshop was allowed to retain lifecycle-replaced computers until the end of the training (November 1).

During the summer and Fall of 2007, the Workshop was able to replace sixteen desktop computers and one laptop computer during the FY 2006-2007 iteration of OVPR's Lifecycle Replacement Funding program.

In light of the expanded need for desktop computers in Fall 2007, and in anticipation of the SKKU Training program being held in January 2008, the Workshop built eighteen Windows Vista-ready Workstations using a combination of new and existing parts at a cost of approximately \$235 each during Fall semester.

So, in total, the Workshop deployed 34 new desktop computers in 2007.

As of 2007, the Workshop is no longer responsible for hosting the IFRI website. This responsibility will devolve to IFRI's primary sponsor at the University of Michigan. Indiana University will remain a Collaborating Research Center (CRC), so it is likely that the current IFRI website will become a (much smaller) CRC website instead.

The Workshop's new server was put into production over the summer of 2007. The interim server, bl-wptp-quest was taken down, and is in the process of being replaced with an updated emergency server. The idea here is to provide a modest amount of hardware redundancy in the event our primary server needs to be repaired.

Transition away from static IP addresses has for all intents and purposes been completed. A few IP addresses are still being used on servers and in other special situations.

Workshop Information Technology Objectives in 2008

The last several years have seen a steady increase in the level of scholarly activity at the Workshop, resulting in larger numbers of long and short-term visitors and proportionate increases in user support requirements.

The primary emphasis for Workshop IT has been to continue to provide a high standard of user support, and to attempt to maintain existing Workshop IT infrastructure at its current level.
